Suffragettes Tribe (Class 4)
Summer Term 2022

This term the class topic will be 'Crime and Punishment'. The intent of this topic is to extend pupils' knowledge of historical changes over time which will include developing their understanding of democracy and rule of law.

The children will learn the following:

- English: SPaG focus lessons; horror stories; publishing pieces of work from
 previous units of work; non-chronological reports (double spread pages) based
 on our Oxford Castle trip; an author visit which will then influence our English
 planning that week; Treason by Berlie Doherty; Holes by Louis Sachar.
- Maths: Percentages, fractions of amounts, dividing by 1 and 2- digit numbers, multiplying by 2 or more digits, multiplying and dividing with fractions, volume, time, solving problems using all four operations and interpreting statistical information.
- Science: Electricity (Spring 1) and Light (Spring 2)
- PE: Maypole dancing, Physical PE skills (through one leg balance and jumping/landing)
- History: How crime and punishment has changed over time (from the Romans to the present day). Why do we have laws and how are they made?
- **Geography:** Geography of crime and locations of famous prisons.
- **Music:** compare and contrast the impact of different composers develop an understanding of the history of music and different different traditions.
- Art & Design: Spooky painting (mood/colour), police sketches, Pop Art (use of ICT), overprinting
- **Design and Technology:** Electrical components: Design and make a burglar alarm that will set off if a switch is pressed unintentionally by the burglar.
- Computing: Blogging and yearbooks

Write an information card to explain what it is, what period of time it was used and any famous criminals that were executed this way.	3 points Research and present information about how people are punished now in the UK. Do you agree with all our current punishments?
3 points Find out about the work of police officers or public defenders. Present your findings in any way you like.	1 point Make a wanted poster for a famous real of fictional criminal (for example: Jack the Ripper, Ann Cotton, Voldemort, and Moriarty). Don't forget to include their crimes and a reward.	5 points Create a fact-file of an executioner What was the job of an executioner? Why were they often masked? Design or research an executioner's outfit. Make sure all diagrams are labelled.
4 points Listen to the news or read a newspaper for a week. Make notes on the crimes reported and how the criminal was punished.	2 points Write a poem of your choice about crime and/or punishment.	5 points Create a timeline of punishment throughout the ages.
